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

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THE WESTERN BOOM

An analysis of US housing compared December 2011 property values to the most recent available index, which was from June 2016. The percentage of change showed a significant variability. Eight different areas actually lost value over this time period.

James Garfield (20th): Enjoyed an occasional bowl of squirrel soup.




Franklin D. Roosevelt (32nd): Enjoyed hot dogs, fruit cake, and toasted cheese.
